Highlights of 2024

Adult Education

We kicked off the year examining the Gospel of Mark during our Epiphany series. Another highlight of the year was an Evensong service and screening of the documentary film "The Philadelphia Eleven" in partnership with the Church of the Holy Trinity Rittenhouse. In July, we began a series titled "Faith & Politics for the Rest of Us," where we discussed theo-political visions and the rise of Christian nationalism. In the fall, we welcomed the Rev. Dr. Susan Richardson, who led parish forums to help us process and reflect on recent changes at St. Peter's.

Feast of Absalom Jones

In February, many St. Peter's parishioners attended a celebratory service at the African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas in honor of Absalom Jones. Here at St. Peter's, interim organist Charles Johnson featured Black composers during each February service to take us on a musical journey through Absalom Jones' life.

Food Cupboard

St. Peter's spent time in January and February learning more about food insecurity during our "Feeding Our Neighbors" series, organized by St. Peter's Social Justice Discernment Group. After this series, we launched our Lenten Food Cupboard fundraiser, where we asked parishioners to make donations to supplement the food we receive from Philabundance. Our parishioners gave generously, raising more than \$10,000. The St. Peter's Food Cupboard served an average of 90 people a week in 2024, with more than 125 people showing up the first Saturday each month when we distribute household goods in addition to our regular food.

Rector Search

In February, interim rector the Rev. Clarke French was named priest-in-charge at St. Peter's. That same month, the Search Committee became the Discernment Committee and launched a discernment process to determine if Clarke should be called as St. Peter's next rector. After a

series of Listening Sessions with the congregation, it was decided to continue with the original intention of a nationwide search. The Discernment Committee returned to their original charge as the Search Committee. Working closely with the Diocesan Office of Transition Ministry, the Search Committee posted its rector job announcement in August and spent the fall reviewing and interviewing potential candidates.

Building Project

In 2024, St. Peter's began working with St. Peter's School to explore the possibility of constructing a shared building on our parking lot. A group of church and school representatives worked with architects to design a two-story 13,000-square-foot building which would provide the church with a large gathering space, kitchen, offices, and meeting rooms. In December, St. Peter's invited parishioners to a series of Listening Sessions to share their hopes and concerns for St. Peter's as we examine our church campus and explore how we might reimagine our physical space to better serve our mission and community.

LGBTQIA+ Support

In April, St. Peter's became a Rainbow Initiative Congregation. This initiative, a program of Episcopal Migration Ministries, empowers congregations to support LGBTQIA+ migrants and bring visibility and aid to those who have fled their countries because of persecution based on sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, and/or sex characteristics. In June, St. Peter's celebrated Pride Month by festooning our church with rainbow flags and joining with other Episcopal congregations to participate in the Philadelphia Pride March and Festival.

Intergenerational Events

As part of St. Peter's ongoing effort to bring parishioners of all generations together, we hosted several all-parish events. We kicked off the year with a Shrove Sunday Pancake Breakfast in the Parish House, with the breakfast cooked by the children and youth of St. Peter's. All ages gathered in June for a combined end-of-year service with special guest Drag Queen Storyteller Balena Canto and ice cream sundaes in St. Peter's Way. Parishioners gathered again for our annual Welcome Back Picnic, an outdoor service in celebration of Creation Season, Ministry Fair, festive Advent Wreath making, and a Christmas Church Greening & Hymn Sing.

Sacred Ground

The formal Sacred Ground program, a seven-month small group that explored racial healing, reconciliation, and justice, ended its official gatherings in June 2024. However, several members of the group continued to meet each month in self-directed study and conversation. They engaged different resources around institutional racism from books to local art exhibits to documentaries and other films.

Social Justice

In 2024, the Social Justice Discernment Group organized a two-Sunday symposium around food insecurity welcoming guest speakers from the South Jersey Food Bank and Bethel AME Victory Community Garden in Ardmore. Following this successful event, SJDG met regularly to discuss how to provide ongoing resources about justice issues to the congregation. Since

September 2024, this ministry has offered more consistent meeting times, thanks to the leadership of Barbara Matteucci. In November 2024, we held a discernment meeting and identified four main issues on the minds of many members of the congregation: food sovereignty, migration, LGBTQIA+ rights, and healthcare (with a focus on women's healthcare). In December 2024, SJDG members self-selected into groups focused on one of these issues and outlined a plan for learning more, finding resources, and other ways to connect the congregation around this issue.

Out and About in the Community

St. Peter's clergy once again brought Ash Wednesday beyond our doors, distributing "Ashes to Go" at Washington Square Park in the morning. Parishioners participated in a summer art project called "Love Rocks" where we painted rocks with colorful messages of love and hope and placed them in our churchyard for passersby to enjoy. Our series of Sumer Concerts in the Churchyard was a success, with three Wednesday evening concerts in June and July. St. Peter's partnered with Episcopal Community Services to participate in its School Supply Drive and Christmas Gift Drive. In October, we invited our neighbors and their furry friends to our annual outdoor Blessing of the Animals. Also in October, Preserve St. Peter's organized its first public program, a Halloween event titled "Churchyard Challenge," which drew dozens into our churchyard to learn about the headstones, monuments, and history of the churchyard.

Whip, Splatter, Stir

In September, parishioner Claire Shrader led the effort to start a new ministry at St. Peter's called Whip, Splatter, Stir: A Cooking Club for People with Parkinson's Disease. The monthly cooking club provides a place for people living with Parkinson's Disease to help foster a special space for community and connection.

Our History & Preserve St. Peter's

The History Committee continued to share stories with the congregation every month in the Spire newsletter, and dedicated volunteers cleaned many gravestones in the churchyard. This year, the nonprofit Historic St. Peter's Church Preservation Corporation, which had been inactive since 2014, reestablished and reinvigorated itself under a new name: Preserve St. Peter's. This organization works as a fund-raising and educational entity closely aligned with St. Peter's Church. In October, Preserve St. Peter's held its first public event "Churchyard Challenge." The organization also raised money for and initiated the renovation of the Memorial Garden on the northwest side of the church. The weeds and invasive plants were removed and the site was mulched in preparation for replanting in spring 2025.

Stewardship Campaign: Living God's Love Out Loud

During the fall's stewardship campaign, we encouraged parishioners to "Live God's Love Out Loud." We posted hearts in the church to represent each pledge, and by the campaign's end, 137 households (including 19 new people) pledged to financially support St. Peter's; altogether pledges totaled \$415,000. We were encouraged that the number of pledgers remained relatively stable and total pledge revenue increased from last year.

Children & Families

St. Peter's 9 AM Family Worship Service remained popular this year, attracting many families with young children. Highlights this year included our Shrove Sunday Pancake Breakfast, Palm Sunday worship service, Easter Egg hunt, and Christmas Pageant. Our Sunday School for older children, which is held during the 11 AM Worship Service, continued its second year.

TNT (20s & 30s)

St. Peter's 20s & 30s group continued to be very active in 2024, holding several series of Zoom Discipleship groups to explore faith, theology, and day-to-day living. Our TNT group also gathered for a spring cookout and a fall potluck.

Sages

This group for retired members at St. Peter's continued their monthly meetings through 2024 with some of the highlights being: Court van Rooten sharing about his experience at a special art exhibit on Sarah Bernhardt while staying in Paris; group discussion on different memories form the 1960s-1970s; overview of the Stations of the Cross during Lent with Rev. Sarah; special presentation by The Reverend Rachel Wenner Gardner about her research on Phillips Brooks.
